C/A 2021 Legislative Priorities

- **Plain Language Ballots.** Simplify & shorten language on ballots, but include full language as an insert, online, and at polling places. Several states have similar laws in place. (Ricky to head, Stephen from SLCo, Marki, Marilyn, Melanie Aplanap)
- **Judicial retention** (might be able to combine w/plain language bill). if unanimous recommendation by panel, then not on ballot, unless citizens petition. Maybe Sen. Weiler as sponsor? Work w/Michael Drechsel from Utah State Courts.
- **Standardize the overall petition policies and create consistency** over similar aspects. For example, define what is and is not a signature for all petitions, state and local initiative and referenda, candidates, form of government, annexation, etc. (Ryan Cowley to chair, volunteers: _____)
- **Electronic Signatures** – We may see bills next session, including one from representative Nelson, that would allow for Signature Gathering to be done online. It would have quite a lengthy process for the voter, requiring them to actually read the full language, or at least not be able to breeze through the actual language.
- **Tax Relief** – Veterans who sell home during the year – prorate the relief instead of %100. Also, move ownership date requirement from Jan. 1 to Sept. 1.
- **Revisit of SB124** – County Auditor authority (Curtis to lead)
- **Elected Vs. Appointed** (Curtis to lead)
- Tax relief asset requirements. (volunteers: _____)

Other items (possible to insert into legislation above or run as standalone)

- Change the canvass period in even numbered general elections so that counties canvass on the 21st day after an election and the state canvasses on the 30th day.
- Marriage licenses – Change expiration from 30 days to 31 or 32 days (or “one month”)
- Marriage licenses as a protected record. (Brian McKenzie)
- Cure letters being exempted from GRAMA until after the election.

All,

I think there are a few key questions we need to answer:

Do voters that are not registered Democrats have a right to vote the ballot? Yes they do.

Does the law require us to send out ballots to all active voters? Yes it does. USC 20A-3-302 2(a)

Is there any question as to which ballot the voter should receive? No, because there is only one ballot that they can receive.

If somebody is going to be upset with us, would we rather have them upset because we sent them the only ballot that they can vote or do you want them to be upset because we chose not to give them access to the ballot? (A ballot that they have a legal right to.) Simply put, people will be upset either way.

Finally, I believe that this preference vote will be publicised and that as a result people will want to vote in it. If we do not send out the ballots, we risk having to explain at the polling locations why they didn't get a ballot and why they can't vote for President Trump. Sending out the only ballot available with an insert explaining why they are getting the ballot is our best hope to reduce confusion and frustration.

Would recommend we follow the same logic we would if they were to walk into a vote center. We wouldn't automatically hand a registered Republican a Democratic ballot. Would we automatically hand an Unaffiliated voter a Democratic ballot? If not, we probably shouldn't automatically mail them a ballot either. Rather, we should ask them (via a letter) if they would like to receive a Dem ballot.

As you know, the Democratic party has an open primary, meaning any voter can vote in that primary. I want to get your feedback on what we should do as a state if there is only a Democratic primary. Should the Democratic ballot be mailed to all voters since all voters are eligible to vote? Since we have the funding for a full election covering the cost of sending all voters a ballot would not be a problem. We will want to be untied if this becomes an issue and be consistent when it comes to who gets a ballot in the mail.

Feel free to discuss this with your staff and then share your thoughts in the next day or two.

I believe the current incorporation cleanup bill makes that fix as we were very aware of that problem from previous incorporations. If you refer to lines 1048-1051 of SB35, the bill aligns the declaration dates with the declaration dates for whichever election is happening that year. So in an general election year those declarations would take place in March along with all other candidates, and in a municipal election year those declarations would take place in June along with all other candidates. If anyone reads that code section differently please let me know.
