Justin,

██████████ registered to vote at the address of ██████████ on April 8, 2006. He has not voted in any election at this address since he registered to vote. We sent him a confirmation notice in 2012 to verify he was still at the address listed above on July 27, 2012. The confirmation notice was returned and updated on October 3, 2012 and a new voter information card was mailed to ██████████ on October 7, 2012. ██████████ again did not vote in any election from 2012 thru 2014 so in March, 2015 he was sent another confirmation notice to verify if he was still living at this address and this notice was never returned. Because the notice was not returned and ██████████ did not vote in any election from 2015 through 2018 his record was removed from the active database on February 8, 2019 due to inactivity.

Hi Pam,

If you take a look at [20A-16-408](#), it states that "a valid military-overseas ballot cast in accordance with [Section 20A-16-404](#) shall be counted in the military-overseas ballot is delivered by the end of business on the business day before the latest deadline for completing the canvass ..."

The way I'm reading the code, [Section 404](#) describes when a ballot is considered valid, but [Section 408](#) clarifies the last day that a valid ballot can be received and counted.

In regards to SB 123

113 (2) Except as provided by Section 20A-1-308, an absentee ballot is not valid unless:

114 (a) in the case of an absentee ballot that is voted in person, the ballot is:

115 (i) applied for and cast in person at the office of the appropriate election officer no later

116 than the Tuesday before election day; or

117 (ii) submitted on election day at a polling location in the political subdivision where

118 the absentee voter resides; 02-27-19 12:13 PM 4th Sub. (Pumpkin) S.B. 123 - 5 –

119 (b) in the case of an absentee ballot that is submitted by mail, the ballot is:

120 (i) clearly postmarked before election day, or otherwise clearly marked by the post

121 office as received by the post office before election day; and

122 (ii) received in the office of the election officer [before noon on the day of the official

123 canvass following] no later than three days after the day of the election; or

(i) clearly postmarked before election day, or otherwise clearly marked by the post office as received by the post office before election day; and

(ii) received in the office of the election officer before noon on the day of the official canvass following the election; or

(c) in the case of a military-overseas ballot, the ballot is submitted in accordance with Section 20A-16-404.

This indicates that you can receive a ballot from a military/overseas voter 6 months or even later after the election and as long as the postmark is valid it should be counted in the results.

What is the Lieutenant Governor's interpretation of this? Is this something that needs to be fixed in the law? Would SB 123 really not have an impact on military/oversees voters?


