Subject: Vote By Mail Press Conference in SLC Thursday, June 2, 10 AM - can you come?

To increase awareness of and confidence in vote by mail and absentee voting, we're going to hold a press conference. Even though not all counties are doing VBM, we all have absentee ballots, and increasing confidence in the by-mail process benefits all counties.

The press conference would describe VBM, how it works, who is doing it, how it benefits voters and government, and how secure the process is. We've scheduled it for Thursday, June 2nd at 10 AM in Salt Lake County. We think it would generate some media attention, and would be good for voters to hear shortly before they start receiving their ballots.

While we'll have 3-4 clerks speak, having all 20 of the VBM county clerks present, to visually show the magnitude of VBM in the state, as well as other clerks who offer permanent absentee options (so, basically, everyone!). If you cannot come because of financial constraints, please let me know, as the C/A Association can help offset travel expenses.

Imagine the interest and benefit if we have all of the county clerks all together at once, proactively informing the public about important elections information!

Please RSVP to me, so we can get a count. We'd love to have everyone there, whether your county is by mail or not.

County Clerks in Utah to hold Vote By Mail press conference on Thursday, June 2 in Salt Lake County

Seventy percent of Utah voters will vote by mail this year. Clerks from Utah's vote by mail counties will discuss why it's so popular and what options citizens have.

Salt Lake County, Utah – On Thursday, June 2 at 10 AM, Clerks representing 20 of Utah's 29 counties will discuss Vote By Mail (VBM) at a press conference held in the Salt Lake County Complex – Elections Division at 2001 South State Street, Room S1-850.

Absentee voting began in 1864, when 230K ballots were cast by soldiers fighting in the Civil War. It has been utilized in Utah for decades, and has become increasingly popular across the nation and in Utah over the past few years. Oregon and Washington have been voting by mail for almost 20 years, Colorado for three years, and over 50% of California's ballots are cast by mail. One fifth of all Utah voters have already requested to be placed on the permanent absentee list, and last year, 90% of all ballots were cast by mail in Salt Lake and Weber counties. This year, the number of Utahns who VBM will likely triple. Twenty of Utah's 29 counties will conduct their elections by mail, increasing accessibility, convenience, and informed voting for 70% of the voting population, almost 1 million voters, at a lower cost than in-person voting.

- The advantages of VBM
- Security concerns and controls surrounding the VBM process
- Voting options that voters have for this year's elections.
- What voters can expect and how they can get help

Is Ranked Choice Voting (RCV) Best for Utah?

Plurality has been a principal concern in the justification for RCV in Utah.

Plurality in Utah

Only 5% of county and state races in Utah had a primary winner by plurality.

RCV as a Solution

RCV only changes the outcome in 3% of elections.

Source: 2000-2018 election results from RCV municipal and state elections in Minneapolis, Maine, San Francisco where first-round leader did not win.

This means that in less than 0.15% of RCV elections, the outcome will differ from current elections.

What option is best for Utah?

This depends on what issues we are trying to address.

- (iv) a statement that, by signing the affidavit, the individual authorizes the lieutenant governor's and county clerk's use of the individual's signature on the affidavit for voter identification purposes.

(c) In order for an individual described in Subsection (5)(a) to have the individual's ballot counted, the individual shall deliver the affidavit described in Subsection (5)(b) to the election officer.

(d) An election officer who receives a signed affidavit under Subsection (5)(c) shall immediately:

- (i) scan the signature on the affidavit electronically and keep the signature on file in the statewide voter registration database developed under Section 20A-2-109; and
- (ii) if the canvass has not concluded, count the individual's ballot.

I brought this up to Mark Thomas when I came across it last year as I was reviewing the laws in preparation for canvass meetings. Our legal counsel confirmed that with this language, a voter could present a cure letter through the **conclusion** of a board of canvassers meeting.

As a result, I notified the city recorders where there were very close contests that they should accept cure letters up until the results were certified by their board. I and another staff member stayed here until the boards of canvassers meetings concluded in case a voter submitted a cure letter. If that had happened, we as a team would have retrieved that voter's ballot, checked the signature from the cure letter the city recorder forwarded to us and opened the ballot if the signature matched. The city recorder would have had to adjust their canvass report accordingly.

A deadline for when cure letters can be accepted needs to be inserted if this hasn't already been done in one of LG's clean-up bills.

I was just wondering if you were you able to find a bill to include the clean-up language to fix 20A-3-308(5)(d)(ii)?

20A-3-308. Absentee ballots in the custody of poll workers -- Disposition -- Notice.

(5) (a) If the election officer rejects an individual's absentee ballot because the election officer determines that the signature on the ballot does not match the individual's signature that is maintained on file, the election officer shall contact the individual in accordance with Subsection (7) by mail, email, text message, or phone, and inform the individual:

- (i) that the individual's signature is in question;
- (ii) how the individual may resolve the issue;

In September, the Government Operations Interim Committee opened a committee bill file that would require a county that conducts a by-mail election to have at least one drop box location, and maybe more. Rep. Patrice Arent is leading out with this bill, and has asked for input from county clerks. This is a good chance for us to help ensure the bill is reasonable.

Please provide feedback on the following items before next Wednesday:

1. The committee is considering establishing a ratio that would determine the number of drop boxes based on voters. Oregon & perhaps Washington have the ratio of one box for each 30K active voters. But there was also some interest in making that ratio lower, say, one box for every 10K active voters. I've included a very rough estimate of how different ratios would impact each county. **What ratio do you think we should recommend and at what point would the ratio be too burdensome for your county?**
2. The committee also considered language that would allow voters to drop a ballot in a box of any county, not just the county to which the ballot belongs. **How much would this impact your county? Would you favor or oppose this being put into code?**
3. Oregon requires a minimum of two drop boxes per county. This might not make sense for small counties. Too much of a burden? Some possible ways to tier this requirement:
 - a. Two minimum for counties of class 1-4. One minimum for class 5-6.
 - b. Some kind of ratio between population and square mileage of the county.
 - c. A minimum distance between at least two boxes (for geographically large counties).
 - d. A box required for each city whose citizens comprise more than X% of the county's total population.

What thoughts/recommendations do you have on this idea? Probably a simple solution would be easiest to implement and manage as the population grows.

Rev your engines! The legislative session starts on Monday, Jan. 25.

On average, over 50 bills are considered each year that directly impact county clerks and auditors. The Clerks and Auditors Legislative Policy Committees help evaluate these bills, provide recommendations, and work with legislators to improve (or defeat) them. Curtis Koch of Davis County heads up the Auditors' Committee and I head up the Clerks' Committee. **We want you to participate.** You don't need to be a lawyer or legislative nerd to participate, and you'd be surprised at how much impact you can have.

Here's what you would do if you wanted to participate:

- **Email** Derek Brenchley (dbrenchley@utah.gov) at the Lieutenant Governor's office and ask to be put on the "vsugleg" email list.
- You'll receive emails with links to bills. **Read** them. Most of them are short and simple. **Share** your concerns, what you like about them, or what you think should be changed.
- **Participate in weekly discussions** on Thursdays at 8:30 AM at the capitol or by phone (details below).
- **Reach out to your own legislators** indicating support for or opposition against the bills. We'll often provide you with talking points and sometimes even the full text of an email, so you can just copy & paste.



Ricky Hatch, Weber County: General awareness of Vote by Mail

Absentee voting in America began during the Presidential election of 1864, when 230K ballots were cast by soldiers fighting in the Civil War. It has been utilized in Utah for decades, and has become increasingly popular across the nation and in Utah over the past few years. Oregon and Washington have been voting by mail for almost 20 years, Colorado for three years, and over 50% of California's ballots are cast by mail. One fifth of all Utah voters have already requested to be placed on the permanent absentee list, and last year, 90% of all ballots were cast by mail in Salt Lake and Weber counties. This year, the number of Utahns who Vote by Mail will likely triple. Twenty of Utah's 29 counties will conduct their elections by mail, increasing accessibility, convenience, and informed voting for 70% of the voting population, almost 1 million voters, at a lower cost than in-person voting.

County Clerks are the first to admit that Vote by Mail is not a perfect elections system – no system is perfect, and counties will always provide options to voters. But, voting by mail provides several advantages over a traditional voting platform:

- First, and most important, Vote by Mail results in more informed and educated voters by proactively placing the ballot in front of the voter three weeks before Election Day. No more being surprised at the voting booth by a race, initiative, or constitutional amendment. A 2016 Weber State University survey found that 79% of voters feel that Vote by Mail allowed them to cast a more informed vote. Couples and families are more likely to discuss the ballot around the dinner table, and can research candidates and issues with the actual ballot in hand.
- Vote by Mail provides critical accessibility and convenience for homebound voters, voters with disabilities, parents of small children, and for people with long commutes and/or work hours.
- Perhaps the most touted benefit of Vote by Mail is increased voter turnout. Especially in traditionally quieter elections, such as primaries and special elections, statistics show an increase in voter turnout.
- The Vote by Mail election format is much simpler to administer than a polling-place format. Counties are not required to hire and train massive numbers of poll workers to handle the often complex and emotional voter situations that arise.
- Finally, Vote by Mail costs less, allows us to extend the life of our current voting equipment, and reduces the cost of future voting systems, as less voting equipment is needed.

While we use the term "Vote by Mail," it's really a hybrid election format. Vote by Mail counties will always have at least one polling place per county open on Election Day to serve voters who need assistance, who lost their ballot, or may have never received it, or who really want the experience of voting in person. Clerks worked with state lawmakers to amend state code to require at least one polling place per county.

I've thrown together a spreadsheet that calculates the costs, based on several assumptions and actual data only from 2 counties at this point. But I think it's pretty close.

It shows an ongoing cost of about \$68K per high-turnout election, plus the one-time programming costs.

Many of these costs are already included in HB70 – Johnson's bill.

Also, Ryan pointed out that Business Reply Mailing costs are much higher for smaller counties, so I broke out counties by 1-3 class and 4-6.

Please take a look and let me know what you think and especially what your numbers of cure letters and active registered voters are.

One interesting note is that the cure rate for Davis and Weber is almost identical: 1.15%.

Now CC'ing Justin for a sanity check (questionable ☺) and b/c of programming costs.
